

FROM THE REVEREND JERED WEBER-JOHNSON

Dear Friends in Christ,

In a culture that values autonomy and individualism, where success is measured in the size of your bank account and the power of your position, it is a very hard thing to speak of, let alone value servanthood. I remember in my undergraduate experience



that my professors and college made a big deal about a concept they called "servant leadership." Knowing full well that many of us entered the classroom with a sense of entitlement indicative of our generation and the wider culture, my professors challenged us to consider how our greatest achievements and legacy might be wrapped up in serving others.

Tony Campollo spoke at our convocation chapel my freshman year, inviting us to consider not getting a job after college (much to the horror of our parents and alumni board), but instead taking a year to offer our lives in service to the least and the hurting in the world around us. In a way that only a Baptist can, Tony adjured us to let go of our sense of entitlement and our striving for success, and to consider being a leader, a servant leader, following in the footsteps of Jesus —to serve instead of being served. During that freshman year I was introduced to the work of Henri Nouwen through his short book, *In the Name of Jesus*. In it Nouwen writes about this notion of leadership and service coming together in our lives modeled on the life of Jesus.

"The world says . . . 'when you grow old you will be able to make your own decisions, go your own way, and control you own destiny.' But Jesus has a different vision of maturity: It is the ability and willingness to be led where you would not rather go."

I have been challenged by this vision of the servant leader. It is a vision that I have tried to live, usually falling short, in my life, at home, and at work. It is a challenge because my ego tells me to worry about what I want, to take care of number 1, to serve myself. So what if the clothes need folding? I need to unplug and watch a show. Yet, this is not what we are called to. From the global to the local, Christians are challenged to live in such a way that we put the needs of others ahead of ourselves—we are to serve and not to be served.

Again, as Nouwen writes:

"The way of the Christian leader is not the way of upward mobility in which our world has invested so much, but the way of downward mobility ending on the cross It is not a leadership of power and control, but a leadership of powerlessness and humility in which the suffering servant of God, Jesus Christ, is made manifest."

In our worship and our study, in our private prayers, our bible study, and the groups where we socialize and practice our faith here at St. John's, this is the goal we might all aspire to, to become leaders as Christ was a leader—serving the least, the lost, the little and the lonely in all that we do, and in this way, serving Christ himself.

- Oversees faith formation programming for children, youth, and families.
- Ensures safe church standards and provide safe church training as required for all leaders.
- Participates in Diocesan ministries to provide opportunities for our youth to participate in the larger diocesan church.

Chris Tegeler, Building Manager, with the help of

- Take care of the building and grounds at St. John's.
- Set-up for meetings and events.

Longkee Vang, Assistant Youth Minister:

Vestry Musings by Don Postema

Contrary to stereotypical Episcopalian summer practices, your Vestry did **not** take a vacation this summer. Meeting in both August and September, the Vestry actively reviewed recent staffing changes, our financial outlook, and the future of St. John's.

On September 17 we welcomed the Rev. Kate Bradtmiller as Associate Rector and Mr. Jayson Enquist as Director of Music. Duly impressed by their respective credentials, we were encouraged to hear their creative plans for their dynamic ministries at St. John's. With the addition of a new Nursery Coordinator, Ms. Lia Hanson, we are now fully staffed for the first time in almost a year. Our rector, the Rev. Jered Weber-Johnson, was even more ecstatic given that he can now revert to only full-time. We are grateful to all those who stepped in to carry us through the past months, especially to Nancy

Wellington who so ably led the Music program in the hiatus.

One of the pluses of not having all budgeted staff positions filled is that we have a surplus as of September 1st. Lest the rejoicing begin prematurely, we noted that full staffing will now match budgeted amounts the rest of the year. In addition, relocation expenses, probable repair expenses for the vault and sidewalk on the west side of the church (ask for a tour of the vault if you're interested!), and increased utilities costs will consume part of the current surplus. The good news is that it is likely we will not have to borrow to fund the costs of renovations for the Crocus Hill Preschool project.

The Crocus Hill Preschool is now ensconced in the second floor of our Education wing, occupying the

classrooms and what used to be the sexton's apartment (a relic of an earlier era). They have nearly reached their licensed maximum enrollment (50 children), and are thrilled to be in residence at St. John's. Coordination with the Godly Play program, which uses the classrooms on Sunday, has proceeded relatively smoothly. In one fell swoop, we've reached out into our community by housing the Preschool in space that was unused during the week, secured an additional source of future revenue for the church, and made the acquaintance of many families who would have never entered our doors otherwise.

The future includes our fall Stewardship Campaign, beginning on October 20. Tony Grundhauser (Director of Development at Hamline University when he's not serving on the Vestry at St. John's) is our Stewardship Chair. His expertise coupled with the dedication of the Vestry and Finance Committee should make this a season to rejoice in, and complete by the beginning of Advent. You might begin to reflect on how you can support St. John's with your generous gifts for 2014.

Our Strategic Planning Committee (SPC) co-chairs, Phyllis Goff and Gabrielle Lawrence, joined us at our August meeting to solicit Vestry members' sense of the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats we currently face (some of you have done such a SWOT analysis elsewhere). The SPC will be meeting with the Vestry during our Fall Retreat, November 1 and 2, to refine their report and recommendations for future directions at St. John's.

Staff, finances, and the future. These are your Vestry's responsibilities. Now you know why we did not take a vacation!

Through the Y, we have been able to help families with items such as uniforms and school supplies. This has taken some of the school start-up strain off of the families financially.


H2H Second Annual Chili Cook-Off

JUMP! for Africa Team Raises More Than \$6,600 for St. John's Clinic Kayoro

On Saturday, September 14, St. John's JUMPERS!—Gary Hagstrom, John Kinkead, Jennifer Kinkead, Therese Anderson, Mary Klauda, and

Don Husband (who did not jump) jumped out of a plane going 125 miles per hours at 13,000 feet. For their bravery, the team raised more than \$6,600 for St. John's Clinic in Kayoro, Uganda. Many spectators were at the jump site to cheer on our jumpers and celebrate the event. Even people from St John's community who are not directly connected to St. John the Evangelist donated to help the clinic become self sufficient.

Since 2008, St. John The Evangelist has partnered with the nonprofit *Give Us Wings* to build and support St. John's Clinic Kayoro in Kayoro, Uganda. Clinic doors opened January 2012 and life for people around Kayoro will never be the same.

Some people noticed that the egg rolls were not all uniform this year. There is a simple explanation for that: This was the first time the youth had almost complete control over making the egg rolls. In years past, the mothers or women's group would handle the preparation and cooking. This year they decided it was important for the youth to show their commitment to this event by doing the work themselves. In short, if you want it, you gotta earn it!

Building a Dwelling Place for God: Confirmation Date Set

When we are baptized, we are reborn in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. We are stones in the foundation of faith, living members of the church, and part of the body of Christ. On Sunday, October 6, Timothy Krall, Payton Kinkead, Lucy Grundhauser, Michaela Allen, Elliott Allen, Matthew Richards, Caroline Krall and Madeline Weinkauf will begin a program of formation for confirmation. Each will begin by washing a stone, giving his or her baptized name, and placing the stone on a central table lit by a candle. In the next months, confirmands will meet to challenge themselves to know the baptismal vows made on their behalf and confirm that, yes, they do believe and do promise to walk in a life of Christ. They will meet with their mentors and they will explore what it means to be a child of God, a Christian, and an Episcopalian. Let us together make room in our daily prayers for the confirmands that they continue to be strengthened and renewed by the Holy Spirit, and as living stones together, they build a dwelling place for God.



Godly Play

Register Your Child for Godly Play Now!

Because we had only two Godly Play storytellers at the beginning of the program year, we decided to postpone the start of Godly Play. Under the revised schedule, **Godly Play officially begins on Sunday, October 13 at 10 am**.

- PreK/K classroom meets in the room next to the nursery.
- Grades 1-6 meet in the second floor classrooms.

Please note: For all of the children to be ready to enter, and listen to the sacred story, we must maintain the integrity of the Godly Play circle. This means we need to provide enough time for our children to slow down and prepare their hearts and minds to listen for God. Please bring your child to Godly Play early – arrival begins at 9:45 am. The door will shut at 10 am, but children will still be welcomed quietly with the help of the classroom assistant/co-teacher.

Our Children Need Our Help!

I am actively recruiting volunteers for the Godly Play ministry! In order for this ministry to be successful we still need many volunteers:

 Storytellers: 2 hours per week, including preparation and classroom time for telling stories, arts, feast, and prayers.



- Classroom Assistants: 1.5 hours per week; greet families, keep attendance, help children to get ready, and support storyteller with classroom management.
- Greeters: 30 minutes per week; greet families, find classrooms, and answer questions.

- Classroom break-down: 30-45 minutes per week; after church – clean up stories and materials and turn bookcases

Training, stories, and supplies are all provided. We would like a commitment for the program year: 26 Sundays, September through May. No classes are held on the First Sunday of each month. 

Some St. John's History Pre-History

Facts gleaned from *The History of the City of St. Paul to 1875* by J. Fletcher Williams, Minnesota Historical Society Press, 1983.

In 1849 James M. Goodhue founded the first newspaper in St. Paul, called *The Minnesota Pioneer*. Goodhue originally intended to name this forerunner of today's *Pioneer-Press, The Epistle of Saint Paul*. He was dissuaded "at the advice of some friends who objected to its irreligious tone."

From the *Pioneer* in 1850:

"Rev. Mr. Breck respectfully invites the attendance of the citizens of Saint Paul at the house of H. A. Lambert, Esq. on Friday, the 2nd day of August, to take into consideration the erecting of an Episcopal Church in St. Paul."

The result of this conference was that a society was organized and the corner-stone of "Christ church" on Cedar street, laid on September 5th following.

(This predates the founding of St. John's by 32 years.)

From the *Democrat*, Sept 30, 1851:

"Never was a city laid out so badly as Saint Paul. The plat looks as if some accident had knocked all of the streets into *pi*. Measures should be taken to straighten them.
