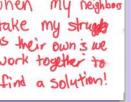

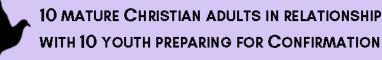

Annual Meeting Address

by the Rev. Jered Weber-Johnson

January 29, 2017

We started this year with a clear and simple theme - Love God. Love Neighbor. Everything we've undertaken from the vestry down to our nursery was an attempt to address this guiding principle taken from the core of our scriptures. Our formation and education series focused on understanding and knowing God, knowing neighbor, and knowing love. Our new member team encouraged us to take a season to focus on inviting our neighbors. Our stewardship this year invited us to consider how we give for God, give for neighbor, and give for love. Our faith in action programs have placed us in deeper touch with our neighbors and in deeper touch with the great needs of our surrounding community and the world beyond our doors, and in so doing, we have come into deeper contact with a God who is alive and well in the lives of the poor, the marginalized, the homeless, and the hungry.

Of course, none of this work is exactly "new" to Saint John's. Ours is a faith community that has always been interested and invested in the work of loving God and loving neighbor. These two core essentials are at the heart of our mission statement and infuse much if not all that we do here. We do these things, we have made them central to our mission, because, as I say, they are central to the mission of Christianity. And, these things are deeply connected. Loving God is, in part, practiced when we love and welcome our neighbor. God tells his people in Leviticus, that "When an alien dwells among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The alien residing among you must be treated as your own. Love them as yourself, for you were aliens in Egypt." And, we read in the gospel of Matthew that tells us whenever we welcome the stranger, we have welcomed Christ. Love of neighbor is deeply entwined with our love of God. So, we have endeavored to live into that connection - welcoming literally dozens of visitors who passed through our doors with abundant hospitality - bread visits and coffees and companion ministry. And, we have sought to be faithful to that mission in even deeper ways - showing up to speak out against racial injustice, serving the homeless as we'll do again in a month with Project Home, and in the act of taking in a refugee family at a time when large swaths of our culture and nation seemed to be moving toward excluding the undocumented, the refugee, and the immigrant. Loving God and loving neighbor has meant we've showed up at Pride and Standing Rock and in one another's homes and each other's bedsides in hours of deepest need.

And, all of this work and so much more, of living into our mandate to love God and love neighbor, has had the net result of helping us grow! As in years past, dozens of new individuals and households have claimed Saint John's as their faith home. Dozens more of our longtime parishioners have grown into their own gifts for ministry - connecting as confirmation mentors and youth leaders, Companions to our newcomers, and vastly expanding our process and program of pastoral care such that we presently have 5 Eucharistic visiting teams and a team of 6 lay pastoral caregivers. We are growing, and this is an exciting time. As Mary Parmer shared

with us over this weekend, in our seminar on Saturday, in her sermon and here at Annual Meeting, growth needs to be sustained - connections must be deepened, our relatedness and relationship needs to expand and strengthen, and our stories need to be shared with each other to be the kinds of people able to love God and love neighbor over the long haul of faith.

In the report that you hold in your hand, you will find markers of a healthy and thriving and growing community. In the reports that you are about to hear you will receive even more information about the physical indicators, budget, attendance, fiscal management, stewardship, and the possibilities our own building could have in store. In all of it, I hope you will listen for ways you can be deepening your own sense of connection, sharing your story as a part of our wider story, and growing with us into the community God has called us to be. In the year to come, I will be working with our vestry and a small team to develop a process of sabbath rest for our parish and for me as your rector. It is the healthy cycle of a church and its priest to observe a 3-4 month sabbatical every 6 years. Our hope is that in that time we will deepen our sense of joy for shared ministry while also deepening our sense of connection one to another and to this community we have helped build and out of which comes great ministry and mission. Stay tuned for more information about all of that in the months ahead.

I am grateful more now than ever before to be a part of this faith community. Your faithfulness to the gospel and your zeal for the good work God has given us, your deep engagement with God's mission is an inspiration and a pleasure to be a part of. Thank you for all you do and give and for all that you are in this place. May we, together, continue to show forth our love for God and love for neighbor.

Annual Meeting Report on 2016 Financials & 2017 Budget

Things are different now at St. John's. Not because we had a \$24K profit last year; we have a profit almost every year. Not because we added a new ministry to aid Refugees; we have an amazing 68 ministries. And not because the tables in the back of the church moved forward a bit; we frequently move things around.

Here's what's different. In 2017 we're taking a major step towards ensuring the sustainability of our ministries, our programs, our staff, our finances and our endowment. Lynn Hertz stood up in front of you months ago and launched our Stewardship campaign; she told you that pledges didn't cover the cost of programs and ministries; that our endowment was forced to make up the difference and that pushed the draw rate to an unsustainable level of more than 5%. She said all of us were getting a dollar's worth of church for only \$0.93.

She asked you to close the gap – and you answered. She asked you to help reduce our reliance on the endowment – and you answered. Pledges for 2017 are at a record level, finally surpassing our previous high back in 2008. They are projected to cover 99% of all program and ministry costs. We're reducing our endowment draw rate to 4.5%. That's a reduction of \$30,000, even though the endowment went up in value last year. I've been involved with the church's finances for 17 years. When I got here, the draw rate was over 8%. It's now the lowest level I've seen. Thank you, thank you for all your generosity....

We're all part of something that's growing. You heard Mary Parmer tell us how to grow. Growth is important. Growth is good. It enables more Outreach, more Music, and from a Treasurer's perspective, it puts us on the road to financial sustainability. It allows us to realize the hopes and dreams that we articulated in our Strategic Plan. The plan is pretty blunt: "It would be desirable to reduce the draw rate to 3.5%-4.0% and have programming supported by pledges, offering, and other revenue sources." Thanks to you, we've taken a big step closer to delivering on that.

Will Rogers said that "Even if you are on the right track, you'll get run over if you just sit there" so we want to keep moving. Lea Anne Schmidt chairs the New Member commission and has done a fabulous job on the front lines of enabling us to grow. The Vestry would like to allocate more of our resources towards growth, perhaps in the form of a new part-time staff position, but there wasn't enough room in the 2017 budget to accommodate that desire and still be able to report those 99% and 4.5% numbers. We're on the hunt right now for ways to fulfill the Vestry's wish. If you want to be part of the solution, please let Lea Anne or me know.

Let's talk financials. Last year we had a profit of over \$24,000. \$3,667 of that will go into our restricted fund for future youth mission trips and the rest will be used to reduce our bank debt. That's the same formula we've used in recent years. Our profit wasn't because we took in more revenue than expected. Revenue was within \$868 of plan, less than a 0.1% variance from budget. The \$24,000 came because we over estimated our expenses. The detailed financial statements show where: payroll (during the year there were changes in people and some positions were unfilled); H2H (we didn't have all the families we originally expected); safe

church (many people now take the program on line at no cost); utilities (I'm going with global warming on this one).

When you look at the 2017 budget, the numbers don't seem much different from 2016. Revenue and expenses both up 6,000 on a total budget of just under 1 million. Not a lot of visible growth. But you'll see there's a new column on the budget handout -2016 actual - and that's where the growth becomes visible because of the over-budgeting of expenses last year.

On the revenue side, the \$6,000 increase masks the fact that in round numbers, pledges are up \$35,000 and endowment income is down \$30,000. On the expense side, payroll looks unchanged when viewing the 2016 and 2017 budgets side by side; but it's actually going up \$15,000 when you consider what we actually spent last year. Ministry expenses look like they're dropping \$3,000 but our pledge to the diocese accounts for the decline and keep in mind that last year was artificially inflated by a one-time expenditure of \$6,000 on piano maintenance.

Outreach also looks unchanged on the budget but in fact spending is going up \$8,000. Parish programs show a drop of \$3,000; that's due to lower safe church and stewardship costs. Operating expenses – this is one category you want to see drop but it's going up \$9,000. Half of that increase is for repair & maintenance which is undertaking a big project this year – installing LED lights in the church. The other half is for a new line item called contingency. That's an unassigned expense right now and a logical source to fund part of our growth initiative.

Before I take questions and then turn it over to our Senior Warden, I want to share two more things. First, some financial modeling. Pledges will cover 99% of program and ministry expenses this year. The formula actually includes all non-endowment income but in case you're wondering what it would take to cover 100%, the answer is another \$8,000. That \$8,000 could come from pledges, non-pledged income, Christmas / Easter offerings, rent from groups using our building, other income. It's a doable number; we might actually achieve that this year.

Reducing the draw on the Cornerstone Trust from 4.5% to 4% means a difference of \$27,000. To get there, either the value of the endowment would have to soar or income from all other sources would have to go up by \$27,000. The first scenario is beyond our control but the second one? Sounds like a Stewardship goal for 2018.

Next. St. John's may be 136 years old but our church is firmly in the 21st century. We're on Facebook, we post our sermons online, we send our newsletters via email, our writer in residence Barbara Mraz shares her thoughts on a blog, you can make your annual pledge online. And sometime this year, we hope to be able to accept credit card payments on Sundays and – wait for it – an app on your smart phone for mobile pledges.

Picture this: Don Husband comes up to you with the offering plate, you take out your phone, push a button, you've made your contribution.

I've done a little research and uncovered evidence that the Bible actually blesses payments from a hand-held device. It's right there, in the Book of Proverbs (3:27):

"Withhold not good from them to whom it is due, when it is in the power of thine hand to do it." And just to be clear, there's no truth to the story that God banished Adam and Eve from the Garden of Eden because of Apple.
